

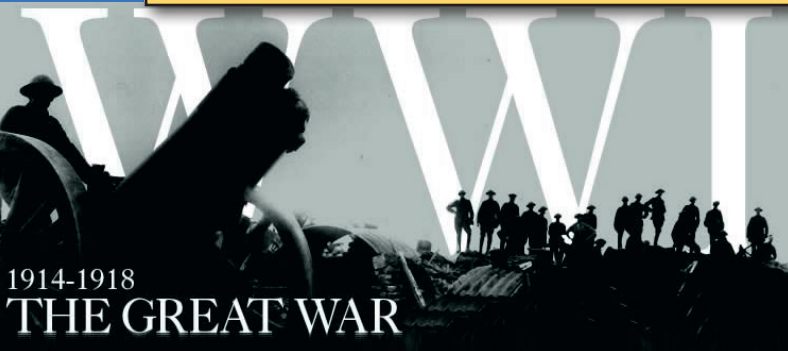

## Introduction

This year, 2015, marks the centenary of the start of the Gallipoli campaign and Australia's involvement as a nation in the greatest and most terrible conflict ever seen to that time. Australians joined their Armed Forces in large numbers. Their motives were as varied as their upbringings, from a need to save the Empire, of which Australia was an integral part, to the desire to have a great adventure.

Braidwood and district was no exception. Over the four years from 1914 to 1918, from a population of about 5000, 465 men and women from what is now the 2622 postcode area – including Braidwood, Majors Creek, Araluen, Mongarlowe, Nerriga, Ballalaba and Jembaicumbene joined the Navy or Army. Of these 377 returned to Australia. Sadly, 88 lost their lives.

A varying amount of their history is recorded in the Australian War Memorial. Some of their names, but not all, are recorded on local memorials. More is recorded in limited local histories and newspapers, not readily available to the general public; and the people who lived with and knew these distant relatives are also passing on.

The Braidwood RSL Sub Branch has collected all the information available from the Australian War Memorial and local sources, including the Braidwood Museum. Families, still resident in the district, have added their family knowledge and their precious memorabilia.

This booklet is the available story of **Arthur Joseph Dayball**, one of the 88 Braidwood volunteers who did not return from World War I. It contains his details as recorded in the World War I Roll of Honour, his Enlistment Papers, Field Service records, any Casualty notification, correspondence relating to his death, details of decorations won, any available photos, and, in some instances, family correspondence or recollections.

**Arthur Joseph Dayball** died for his country, for you and for me. Please pause a moment to remember him.

## WORLD WAR I

*World War I lasted four years, from 4 August 1914 until 11 November 1918. It began after the assassination of the heir to the Austrian throne. The axis powers were Germany and Austria. Russia and France were the initial allies. When Germany invaded Belgium, Britain entered the war on the side of Russia and France.*

*The war was in Europe, the Western Front was in France and Belgium. The Eastern Front was Russia and Austria-Hungary. Africa was another front because of colonial possessions on that continent, and after Turkey entered the war on 1 November 1914, the Middle East became another theatre of war.*

*Australians generally thought of themselves as an integral part of the British Empire and the Australian Army and Navy were part of the Imperial Forces. In 1914, Australia's Prime Minister, Andrew Fisher, immediately promised Australian support for Britain 'to the last man and the last shilling.' The Australian population was less than five million. 324,000 Australians served overseas. 61,720 lost their lives. 155,000 were wounded. 4,044 became prisoners of war (397 died while captive).*

*The first Australian troops were sent to Egypt in 1915. The ANZACS – Australian and New Zealand Army Corps – were engaged in battle on the Gallipoli Peninsula against the Turks to control the Dardanelles' and open the way to Eastern Europe with their fateful landing on 25 April 1915.*

*The ANZACS were evacuated on 19-20 December 1915. The Gallipoli campaign resulted in the deaths of 7,600 Australians and the wounding of 19,000. Despite the defeat, the legend attached to the heroism, comradeship and valour of the soldiers remain a source of Australian pride and national identity.*

## Australian Engineers

Australian Engineers in the First World War, also known as sappers, were essential to the running of the war. Without them, other branches of the Allied Forces would have found it difficult to cross the muddy and shell-ravaged ground of the Western Front. Their responsibilities included constructing the lines of defence, temporary bridges, tunnels and trenches, observation posts, roads, railways, communication lines, buildings of all kinds, showers and bathing facilities, and other material and mechanical solutions to the problems associated with fighting in all theatres.

The Engineer unit war diaries have been digitised as part of the larger project to digitise all the First World War unit diaries. Sapper, Arthur Joseph Dayball was reported *Missing* on 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1915 and reported *Killed in Action* on 25 July 1915. Following is an excerpt from the diaries from 22 - 25 July for the 1<sup>st</sup> Field Company, Australian Engineers:

Private Arthur Latta and Private Dayball, of Nelligen, are amongst the recently wounded in France.

Applications for enrolment on the list of electors for the Municipality of Braidwood must be lodged on or before October 7th.

Pte. Philip Dayball, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dayball, Nelligen, has been wounded. Another son, Sapper Arthur Joseph Dayball, is missing, and the third, Pte. Albert Dayball, is now on his way to the front.

I know Allen; he was a Scotsman and his name was William. He, Dayball and the other men in No. 4 section, went out beyond positions on the 3rd. day of the attack, to make a "strong point", between the lines, but the firing was too heavy. Dayball was wounded and Allen volunteered to go for a stretcher but Allen was hit just before leaving. The others returned but these men were left. Mr. Peck, Jack Davis, and two others volunteered to go out and look for them but I do not know if they went. Cpl. Sutt of No. 4 Section, could give further information. 2 days later a man out of the 1st. Pioneers, sent in word that he had seen Allen lying out there dead.

Friday 25th July.	<p>No 4 &amp; 4 Sections were employed during the morning consolidating &amp; deepening the original front fire trenches to left &amp; right from X10 b 46. At 0230 No 3 section under Lt Col McByde was instructed to construct a strong point at X4 b 7 1/2. 7 1/2. Owing to delays along communication trenches and shelling, work was not commenced until 0500. This position was quite exposed and at 0930 work had to be stopped owing to the heavy shelling, and the sappers suit back. Work done - 50' fire trench completed, one 176 emplacement completed and one half completed &amp; 100' of old German communication trench running alongside SE side of Orchard cleared out and deepened. The section arrived back at the old front firing line at X10 b 46 at 1200. At 1300 orders were received from CRE to take the Company back to billets &amp; to arrange to hand over works to 3rd Divd Coy as soon as possible. This was completed by 1400 &amp; two NCOs met CC 3rd Divd Coy at GORDON DUMP at 1200 to act as guides. The Company assembled at GORDON DUMP at 1400 and proceeded to ALBERT by fourteen waggons - arriving there at 1600.</p>	<p>10 R. J. McByde</p>
